Staying Connected

You now have several different options when it comes to staying connected with Emergency Services: the Emergency Services website, Twitter and Facebook. Log onto our website at www.co.warren.oh.us/emergencyservices. Divided into two sections, Dispatch and Emergency Management, the Dispatch section educates the community on our daily operations and what to expect when they call 911 for an emergency. The webpage also features our past and present employee of the month, call statistics, and info on our training program. Filling out a records request has never been more convenient for the public! Fill in the appropriate fields for the request, click on <Email this form> located in the bottom right hand corner and it's directly sent to the Emergency Services Office. We also have current and previous issues of 'Dispatch Times' newsletters posted in addition to a Kids Corner section with activities that are updated monthly.

The Emergency Management section of the website is a great place to find the resources you need for natural or manmade disasters. You will find links to several useful pages that give expert tips and lists of items to have on hand in order to be prepared. You will also find recourses for recovery after a disaster. Additional links include training opportunities, the Access and Functional Needs Registry, past and present exercises and many more. There are times extra participants are needed for exercises so make sure to frequently check that tab. Ever wonder how we answer all those calls when there is a natural disaster? Check out the Operations Tab to see how our Emergency Operations Center (E.O.C.) is set up to handle natural and manmade disasters. We are always working to improve our center and keep this section updated as much as possible.

If there is a storm that is moving toward Warren County there will be up to the minute updates posted on both platforms to make sure our citizens are alerted. New Dispatch Consoles

The new dispatch consoles have arrived and are currently being installed in the new communications center. They will include several new features that will make it easier for dispatchers to do their job. A few of the new features include the ability to raise and lower both the monitors and the keyboard work areas, heating and cooling system with personal controls at each console, 6 stacked monitors and a lighting system to help notify other dispatchers when someone is talking on a radio or taking a call. Their will be a total of 14 new consoles in the new center plus an elevated supervisor position.



Did You Know?

Memorial Highways – by: Brian Holtel

Did you know that multiple State, Interstate and US highways in Ohio have official memorial designations in Ohio Revised Code approved by the Ohio General Assembly? These routes in Warren County include the following:

- State Route 3 (which follows the same route as US RT 22 in Warren County) is known as the "Thirty-seventh Division Memorial Highway."
- US Route 42 in Ohio is known as the "Forty-second 'Rainbow' Division Memorial Highway."
- US Route 42 in Warren County is known as the "Warren County Veterans Highway."
- US Route 42 between Butler-Warren Rd and Bunnell Rd in Warren County is known as the "SFC William B. Woods, Jr. Memorial Highway."
- State Route 28 is known as the "General Duncan McArthur Highway."
- US Route 22 in Ohio is known as the "Sherman-Sheridan-Stanton-Custer Highway."

 The Interstate 71 bridge over the Little Miami River is known as the "Jeremiah Morrow Bridge."

- Interstate 75 in Ohio is known as the "American Legion Memorial Highway" as well as the "Pearl Harbor Memorial Highway" and "Tuskegee Airmen Memorial Trail."
- Interstate 71 in Ohio is known as the "Disabled American Veterans' Highway."
- State Route 122 in Warren County between Atrium Blvd and Wilson Farm Blvd is known as the "Capt. Bartt D. Owens Memorial Highway."
- State Route 48 is known as "U.S.A.F. Pararescue Memorial Parkway."
- US Route 42 between Lebanon and Waynesville is known as the "Sergeant Brian Dulle Memorial Highway."



Reminder on Road Call Outs


Roadways require maintenance during all hours of the day. To facilitate a call out the Premier Map (ATM) is color coordinated by authority. Reasons for call outs include inclement weather, hazardous roadways, sign damage, safety barriers, pot holes and damage to roadways. A call out can be requested from a police or fire department. If the request to notify is after hours, holidays, or weekends we will page the appropriate road department. We do not call a business line and leave messages. When a call out is requested at an intersection, the highest authority is contacted. Remember, when calling the on call person we **DO NOT** leave messages.

Below are the colors used for Warren County roads on the ATM map and the corresponding departments:

Green - ODOT
Blue - County

Yellow - ODOT Purple - Township **Red - ODOT**Black - City or Village

Call of the Month

On October 18th around 02:30 dispatch received a 911 call from a cell phone. The dispatcher heard screaming and what sounded like struggling and then the line disconnected. When the Dispatcher called the phone back a female answered the line and advised that 2 subjects just busted in her door and tried to assault the complainant and her boyfriend. Complainant said that she and her boyfriend were locked in their bedroom and when she told the suspects that she was calling the police they left the room but unsure if they left the residence. The suspects were described as 1 black and 1 white male and the caller was unaware of any weapons. The boyfriend told the caller that he may know one or both of the suspects. The call taker remained on the line with the caller and kept her calm until the deputies arrived. According to the deputies comments in the call, they identified one of the suspects and checked his residence and his employer where he was not found. They also noted that a warrant would be issued for the suspects arrest for burglary and various other charges. The dispatcher that took the call was Erin Caito.
