Retired Mason Police K9 "Major" 2010 - 2018

Mason Sgt. Michael Bishop first certified with K9 "Major" in January 2012, when they began working as a team. Major was born and raised in Germany where he obtained an obedience title under his original name, "Jasso von Eichendorf."

Purchased entirely with donation money from local organizations and businesses, when he arrived in the U.S., Major was trained and certified in narcotics detection and patrol. His patrol duties included human tracking, area search, building search, article and evidence search, criminal



apprehension, and handler protection. He also received certifications during his career from the State of Ohio, USPCA, NAPWDA, and NAPCH.

Besides being successful in tracking and narcotics detection, Major received a lifesaving award in 2012 for tracking and locating an endangered, elderly man. In

2015, he located 17lbs of GHB, otherwise known as the "date rape drug," the largest seizure of this drug recorded in this region.



Major was a very social partner that loved to interact with the children in the community. He was a favorite at schools and community events because of his gentle, approachable nature. In December 2017, Major was diagnosed with K-9 Degenerative Myelopathy, a neurological disease with no known cure and he retired.

Widely known and loved by law enforcement and community members alike, Major enjoyed his final months at home with Sgt. Bishop and passed away at the age of 8 on May 11, 2018. He will be truly missed!

Did You Know?

Ohio Drivers License and ID Card Changes July 2018 By Chris Dill

The days of waiting while your Drivers License or ID card is printed at the BMV are coming to an end. This change goes into effect July 2, 2018. You will still initiate driver's license and identification card transactions by visiting the BMV and they will still photograph you, however you will only receive a temporary proof of transaction. Your driver's license or ID card will be mailed to you in about 10 days.



There are a few reasons for the change. Besides complying with federal regulations, this allows for a centralized point of produc-

tion. Additionally, this will make licenses and ID cards more secure and will save costs.

With this change, you will now have the option to receive a license or ID card that is acceptable for federal identification purposes. Beginning October 2020, new federal travel restrictions will require a secure Identification. Ohio is getting the early jump on this regulation by offering this secure identification now. A secure ID will meet all federal requirements for access to federal facilities such as TSA, airport security screening and boarding commercial airlines. Warren County Will Host 2018 World Championship Ultimate Frisbee Matches

The World Flying Disc Federation selected Warren County as host for their 2018 club matches in which over 3,000 athletes from over 50 countries will participate. The tournament, scheduled for July 14th-21st, will include 128 teams from around the globe and will be held at the Lebanon Sports Complex. Finals will be held at Mason High School.

The U.S. Olympic Committee is also expected to attend as part of their process to determine if this sport



will be included in the 2028 Summer Games. The championship matches take place every four years, taking place in 2014 in Lecco, Italy. Lebanon was one of three candidate cities being considered for the event and was chosen over cities in the Netherlands and France.

This sport was first developed in 1968 in New Jersey and combines the non-stop movement of soccer with passing and similar end zones as football with the object of the game to catch a pass in the opponent's end zone.

In The Spotlight

Addressing Safety Concerns at Our Schools By Brian Holtel

As more security threats and incidents occur in schools, both locally and across the nation, school districts in Warren County have reviewed security procedures. Some steps used to address security include lockdown and active assailant drills, enhanced school resource officer programs., improved security camera coverage and building access procedures.

In recent years, state laws have changed to add "school safety drills" to the mandatory fire and tornado drills already required. Out of those, one must include a scenario where students are secured inside the building, as opposed to being rapidly dismissed. These safety drills must also be conducted in conjunction with local law enforcement. These are in addition to practicing the use of the MARCS school radios twice each school year.

The Warren County Career Center is one of those schools that is updating their security camera system. This includes the main campus as well as the Greentree Health Science Academy at Atrium Hospital in Middletown. Not only do school officials on site have access to these camera feeds, but access has also been given to law enforcement and dispatch. They will be able to view school activity in real time as well as access archived footage.

Finally, police presence has been addressed by several law enforcement agencies. In March, Wayne Local Schools announced that Waynesville Police Department has assigned Officer Ryan Wells as a school resource officer in their schools. Springboro Police Department added a detail officer to pa-



trol the school grounds, in addition to the two resource officers already in the schools. Mason Police as well as Warren County Sheriff's Office are both looking into adding additional resource officer assignments at the beginning of the next school year.

These are some of the steps that are being taken to keep our schools safe, even as every day brings more discussions on lockdown drills and procedures, metal detectors, see-through backpacks, safe rooms, and armed teachers and administrators.

During this week, all active duty public safety personnel were allowed free admission into the park and to purchase discount tickets for their family members. Park goers were also given the opportunity to interact with emergency response teams and vehicles on certain days.

The Warren County Department of Emergency Services was at Kings Island throughout the weekend, giving the public a chance to spin the wheel to answer preparedness questions on topics such as winter and summer safety, tornadoes, thunderstorms, flooding, emergency preparedness, and 911 communications. Personnel also handed out preparedness infor-



mation and gave tips on how to write family emergency plans. This was a great opportunity for the department to interact with the public and help prepare citizens for emergencies and disasters.


